Migrate Art announces 'Scorched Earth'

Following on from a successful exhibition, Migrate Art presents an auction of brand new works from some of the world's leading artists. Each work has been created using Migrate Art's custom 'Scorched Earth' paint, which was pigmented with ash from the burnt crop fields of Iraqi Kurdistan. The initiative is raising funds to support the work of our three charity partners- RefuAid, Refugee Community Kitchen and The Lotus Flower.

In 2019, Migrate Art visited refugee camps in Iraq with one of our charity partners- The Lotus Flower, to meet some of the thousands of people our projects have benefitted. One of the first things that stood out about the region was decimation of the land. It has been estimated that hundreds of thousands of acres of crops have been burnt across Iraq since our visit in 2019- amounting to tens of millions of dollars of possible revenue and resultant loss of food that is desperately needed amongst an already ailing population. General consensus suggests that these fires function as intimidation tactics organised by militia groups- most likely ISIS.

Whilst on this trip Simon Butler, Migrate Art's founder collected some of the ash from the burnt crop fields with the idea of incorporating it into paint for artists to use when making an original artwork. Jackson's Art Supplies kindly helped us produce high-quality oil and acrylic paints, using this ash as pigment. The paint was sent to some of the worlds leading artists and the resulting artworks will be sold as part of Christie's Post War and Contemporary Day Sale on the 23rd October 2020, and on view from the 10th-22nd of October. All of the funds raised will go towards supporting the work of our three charity partners.

"Whether or not today's refugees are fleeing from political or economical trouble, I identify with, and have great empathy for the sense of displacement they must feel. The only way I can express my true feelings is through my art - as a means of release and escapism - so I am happy to be contributing to the Migrate project in aid of this worthwhile cause" - Raqib Shaw

"When I was approached to take part in Migrate Art's project, I kept thinking about this intense, primal love that a mother has over her children, how I feel about my two children. As a mother, there is no greater fear than being displaced or without shelter for me and my family. I felt inspired to participate because providing safe passage for families and refugees is important work, and I'm honoured to be able to help. "Coming from the region and having witnessed what happened to Yezidis through friends and media as well visiting the refugee camps near Duhok in 2018, the cause of this project resonated with my sense of rage, helplessness and the urge to help as an artist. My work increasingly considers the precarious relations between collective identity, interdependence and its constraints on the individual through considerations of heritage, tradition, homes, borders, mobility and migration in general so with this project I'm combining many of these themes within this new work titled 'Trials'."

Butler has worked in many of London's most prominent galleries and Syer co-founded My Art Broker, one of the UK's leading online art marketplaces. Major past projects include 'Multicolour' which invited artists including Anish Kapoor, Sean Scully and Rachel Whiteread to create works using pencils and crayons found on the former site of the demolished Calais Jungle refugee camp. The works were auctioned at Phillips in 2019, raising £131,000. Migrate Art has raised over £200,000, helping to fund projects across three continents, positively impacting the

lives of over 15,000 people.

RefuAid has developed a programme that supports access to language tuition, education, employment and family reunification for refugees who are granted asylum in the UK. RefuAid offers interest-free loans for those who have been forced to leave their country and are unable to find suitable employment once in the UK. RefuAid's programme provides an opportunity to gain relevant qualifications, re-train, learn English and find employment.

About The Lotus Flower:

The Lotus Flower provides safety, support and education for women and children who have been displaced by war and develops opportunities and tools for these women to become financially independent. They offer psychological support for those who have experienced extreme violence or sexual assault in their home country. The Lotus Flower was founded by Taban Shoresh, a former Kurdish child refugee, who escaped the clutches of Sadam Hussain's regime in the 1980s.
